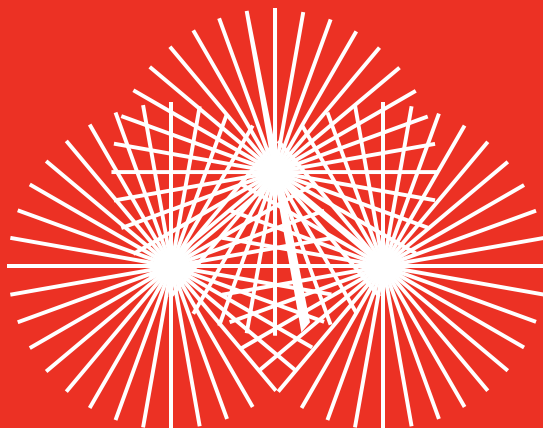

How to enter

The Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of South Australia encourages people of all ages to enter competitive horticulture at the Royal Adelaide Show. We believe you will find it a most rewarding experience. These notes are intended to help you.

- This Prize Schedule includes the Conditions of Entry, closing dates for entry and other important general information. It also provides information about the specific requirements for the various sections and classes available for entry. Entries can include various items such as daffodils, potplants, camellias, bonsai, Australian native plants, orchids and special classes for Juniors and Teenagers.

Please read the Prize Schedule carefully.

- Complete the enclosed Entry Form and return with payment by 5pm on the closing date for entries (see Prize Schedule). Entry forms can be delivered in person to the Administration Office (9am – 5pm Mon – Fri) or sent by post to PO Box 40 Goodwood, SA 5034. Facsimiles are not accepted.
- Payment can be made by cash, cheque or credit card.
- Once your entry has been received, checked and processed, you will receive all the necessary information you require to bring your entries onto the Showground for staging and judging, including exhibitor and vehicle passes.
- Should you choose to become a member of the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of SA Inc. you will be entitled to a reduced entry fee (see Membership details in the Prize Schedule).
- If you require any assistance or further clarification, please do not hesitate to contact the Show Office on 8210 5211 during business hours (9am – 5pm Monday to Friday).

CLOSING DATE OF ENTRIES

The following conditions will strictly apply:

- All entry forms and fees whether lodged in person or sent by post, must be in the Society's possession at its Administration Office by 5.00 pm on Friday 25 June 2010 or 5.00 pm on Friday 30 July 2010. **Please check section closing dates.**
- Postal entry forms and fees will be accepted up to and including entries postmarked on or before the official closing date
- A late entry option is offered under the following conditions:
Received or postmarked within 7 days of the official closing date.
and
an additional fee equivalent to three times the standard entry fee per class is to be paid.
- When sending entry forms and fees by post, the onus is on the exhibitor to ensure adequate delivery time.
- Entry forms by facsimile will not be accepted.
- If you require formal acknowledgement that your entry has been received, please include a stamped, self-addressed envelope with your entry form.

PAYMENT OF FEES

When paying fees by cheque or credit card, exhibitors must ensure that sufficient funds are available at the time of entry. Failure to do so may result in non-acceptance of entries.

ENTRY FEES

The entry fee (GST included) for each class is:

- Members \$4, non-members \$5 (unless otherwise specified),
- Bonsai Artistic: Members \$12, non-members \$15,
- Bonsai individual classes: Members \$6, non-members \$8,
- Junior classes: \$2.50 each.

Exhibitors whose total entry fee is \$50 or more will be issued with a full show pass. Other exhibitors will be given admission tickets for the day/s on which exhibits will be judged and/or removed. **All exhibitors who wish to enter the Showground during 3rd to 11th September will need an exhibitors pass.**

WITHDRAWALS

All withdrawals must be made in writing and can be sent via email to info@adelaideshowground.com.au or faxed to (08) 8212 1533. Emailed withdrawals must include "Withdrawal" in the subject line and the section (eg Horticulture), exhibitor name, class number, exhibit number (if known) and exhibit name (if applicable). Withdrawals must be made at least 24 hours prior to judging.

MEMBERSHIP

Information on RA&HS Membership and member's privileges are included in this Prize Schedule. Membership fees: Adults \$125 Juniors (under 18) as at 1 January 2010: \$42 Membership entitles you to a reduced exhibitor entry fee.

LOCATION OF EXHIBITS

Horticulture will be exhibited in the northern end of Goyder Pavilion. Arrival and departure times as stated in each section of the Prize Schedule.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are reminded that the Society's General Regulations apply to all sections of the Show and that the Special Regulations which apply to Horticulture are supplementary to and subject to the General Regulations. A copy of the General Regulations can be down loaded from the Society's website at www.theshow.com.au or a copy may be obtained upon request from the Society's Administration Office

PRIZES

A society medal may be awarded to the "Most Outstanding Exhibitor" in the Horticulture section at the 2010 Royal Adelaide Show.

- In all classes, prizes will be awarded to the successful exhibitors.
- It is the exhibitor's responsibility to collect awarded prize cards from their exhibit at the time of removal.
- **RA&HS Prize Sashes will be awarded to all Champions.**

PRIZE MONEY

Exhibitors may request any prize money won during the Royal Adelaide Show be paid by EFT (Electronic Funds Transfer) by completing the form provided. EFT is a more efficient payment method. Exhibitors not requesting payment by EFT will be paid by cheque. Prize money will be paid at the end of October 2010.

VEHICLE ACCESS

Exhibitors requiring vehicle access to deliver and/or remove their exhibits must complete the "Application for Vehicle Permit" and submit with entry form.

EXHIBITS

- Any exhibit not displaying the exhibitor's number at the commencement of the judging cannot be judged.
- When plants and flowers are individually displayed, plant name must be affixed to the exhibit. Cards for this purpose will be supplied by the Society and can be obtained from the hall supervisor.
- Plants and flowers should be free from pests and diseases at the time of judging.
- No exhibitor will be allowed to remain in the hall during judging.
- The Society will under no circumstance hold itself responsible for any loss, damage to, or misdelivery of any exhibit.

BANKSIAN MEDAL

This award is made by the **Royal Horticulture Society, England** for a display of horticultural excellence.

JUDGING

The judge's decision will be final, and no correspondence or discussion will be entered into. In all classes, where a number of species and/or cultivars are called for, judges will take into account the difficulties associated with their cultivation. Judges are empowered to withhold prizes in any class where exhibits are below acceptable standard. They may award second prize in lieu of first. No exhibitor or exhibitor's agent shall act as a judge or steward in a class in which he/she exhibits.

DEFINITIONS

Novice exhibitor - A novice exhibitor is one who has not won a First Prize at any Royal Show in the section in which that exhibitor is competing.
Bloom - one flower displayed on a single stem
Cut - Two or more flowers or florets displayed on a single stem or a stem with secondary branches.

PLANTS IN CONTAINERS

- The size of the containers is set out in the schedule.
- A space of 600mm x 600mm will be allocated per entry.
- Exhibitors to supply own saucer.
- **Plants must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor for a minimum of 40 days prior the close of entries.**
- Every plant must be established in the container in which it is shown, and be free from pests and disease at the time of judging.
- Prize money will be forfeited where an exhibitor removes any plant from exhibition after it has been judged but before the official removal time.

YOUR PRIVACY

If you do not wish your details to be made available to other parties, please tick the box on the entry form supplied by the RA&HS. Your personal information will only be used by the RA&HS to maintain contact with you and allow us to manage your entries. The RA&HS reserves the right to inform prize sponsors the details of recipients to enable distribution of their voucher/product prizes to the winner.

PRIZE MONEY AND GST

Prize money as stated in the Prize Schedule does not include GST. The prize money which we pay to successful exhibitors depends on information provided to us.

If you confirm that you are GST registered and provide your Australian Business Number, we will pay the appropriate prize money plus 10% GST. We will provide you with a Recipient Created Tax Invoice detailing the GST which you will need to submit to the Australian Tax Office. In entering the competition, you acknowledge your agreement to the following:

- You will not issue a tax invoice to the RA&HS in respect to the prize money received;
- You will notify the RA&HS if you cease to be registered for GST.

If you provide your Australian Business Number but are not registered for GST, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Prize Schedule without reference to GST.

If you confirm that you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Prize Schedule without reference to GST.

IMPORTANT

It is important that you either:

- confirm that you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, or
- provide your Australian Business Number.

There is a specific area on the entry form to allow you to do this.

Failure to do either of the above will cause the RA&HS to withhold 48.5% of your prize money in accordance with Australian Tax legislation.

The RA&HS is not a tax consultant and therefore assumes no liability for actions taken as a result of these guidelines. In any instances where an entrant or sponsor is uncertain of the tax implications of their involvement, they should consult their own accountant or tax advisor.

NARCISSUS (DAFFODILS)

Note: Daffodils shall be shown with two leaves.

Accepted Divisions.

1. TRUMPET DAFFODILS – One flower to stem. Trumpet or corona is as long as or longer than perianth segments.
2. LARGE CUPPED DAFFODILS – One flower to stem. Cup or corona is more than one third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth.
3. SMALL CUPPED DAFFODILS – One flower to stem. Cup or corona not more than one third the length of the perianth segment.
4. DOUBLE DAFFODILS – No cup, trumpet or corona visible as such. Two distinct types of petals may be noted, usually twisted and intermingled. Flower may be one colour or bicoloured and double or semi double in the corona and/or perianth.
5. TRIANDRUS HYBRIDS – Characteristics of Narcissus triandrus clearly evident. Flowers nodding, numbering one or more, white or yellow. Corona usually bowl shaped, perianth reflexed, of silky texture.
6. CYCLAMINEUS HYBRIDS – Characteristics of Narcissus cyclamineus clearly evident. Flowers nodding, single, yellow with narrow corona and reflexed perianth.
7. JONQUILLA HYBRIDS – Characteristics of any of the Narcissus jonquilla group clearly evident. Flowers numbering one or more with short cup and flat perianth, sometimes fragrant.
8. TAZETTA HYBRIDS – Characteristics of any of the Narcissus tazetta group clearly evident. Small, very fragrant flowers numbering one or more with very short cup and rounded flat perianth.
9. POETICUS HYBRIDS – Characteristics of the Narcissus poeticus group without a mixture of any other. One flower to stem, with glistening white perianth and very small flat cup, usually yellow or green with red edge.
10. SPECIES AND WILD FORMS AND HYBRIDS – Includes all Narcissus presumed to have originated in the wild, as opposed to cultivars and garden varieties.
11. SPLIT CORONAS – Corona split for at least one third of its length.
12. MISCELLANEOUS – Includes cultivars and varieties of garden origin not covered in any other Division.

EXHIBIT REQUIREMENTS

1. All divisional exhibits are required to conform with the above classifications.
2. Narcissus (daffodils) shall be shown with Narcissus (daffodils) foliage.
3. Lily (Arum) stem may be used in staging and may be visible for a maximum of 25 mm above the neck of the container and may be used to support the name card.

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COMPETITIVE EXHIBITORS

Conditions of Entry

RISK MANAGEMENT HAZARD REPORTING

Competitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or the Venue Management Office immediately of any hazards detected. Hazards are any situation that could result in:

1. Injury, illness or death to people or animals
2. Damage or destruction to property

INCIDENT REPORTING

Competitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or the Venue Management Office immediately an incident occurs which has resulted in:

1. The injury, illness or death of any person or animal
2. The damage, destruction or loss of property
3. A near miss incident that could have resulted in the consequences listed in 1 and 2

WASTE DISPOSAL

All waste including liquids must be disposed of responsibly. Storm drains must not be used for the disposal of any waste.

HAZARD MINIMISATION

All areas must be kept in a clean and tidy order with clearly defined and available access and exit routes at all times. Build up of combustible waste must be avoided.

Care must be taken to minimise trip hazards and obstacles that people may walk into. Avoid laying unprotected cables or pipes on or above paths, walkways or roads.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The RA&HS are to be advised of all hazardous materials that are to be brought onto the Showground. Appropriate warning signs and Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) will need to be provided before allowing these materials on site.

MEDIA COMMENTS

Any public comment on emergencies, incidents or other venue matters should only come from the RA&HS. The key media spokesperson for the RA&HS is the Marketing Manager.

DUTY OF CARE

All competitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to situations which could lead to injury. This "Duty of Care" extends to the prevention of damage to property.

LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY

1. Release

Entry to and remaining on the Showground is entirely at the risk of the Exhibitor and to the maximum extent permitted by law, the Exhibitor releases the Society (which term includes in this clause the Society's officers, employees, members and agents), from all claims and demands of every kind resulting from any accident, damage or injury occurring at the Showground, and without limitation, the Exhibitor acknowledges:

- (a) the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to or caused by any Exhibit;
- (b) the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to or caused by any Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees and Agents;
- (c) the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to a Motor Vehicle or any of its contents whilst it is located on the Showground; and
- (d) without limiting Regulations 1 (a) and 1 (b) above, the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury resulting from the sale, treatment, failure to treat, destruction, disposal or other dealing with any Exhibit, or for loss, damage or injury to any personal belongings, equipment or property brought onto the Showground.

2. Indemnity

To the maximum extent permitted by law, the Exhibitor must indemnify and keep indemnified the Society and its officers, employees, members and agents from and against all actions, claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, expenses and liabilities including without limitation, consequential loss and loss of profits for which the Society is or may be or become liable in respect of or arising from:

- (a) loss, damage or injury to any person in connection with the Exhibit or the relevant Event;
- (b) without limiting Regulation 2(a), loss, damage or injury to any other Exhibit or Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees, Agents, or to the property of the Society, or its members, or to the general public, caused or contributed to or by any act or omission of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor or by the Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees or Agents; and

COMPETITIVE EXHIBITORS

Conditions of Entry

- (c) without limiting Regulation 2(a), loss, damage or injury to the Exhibit, or the Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees, or Agents caused or contributed by an act or omission of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor or by the transportation, feeding or housing of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor.
- 3 Removal from Showground
Without prejudice to any other provision in these Regulations, where the Society, its officers, employees, members or agents removes an Exhibit, or causes an Exhibit to be removed from the Showground, the Exhibit is removed or caused to be removed entirely at the risk of the Exhibitor. The person or persons removing the Exhibit will be deemed to be the agent of the Exhibitor, and his or her acts and omissions will be deemed to be the acts and omissions of the Exhibitor.
4. Insurance
The Society will arrange Compulsory Owner's Liability insurance cover for all Exhibitors of Exhibits being animals. The Exhibitor is bound by the terms and conditions of this insurance and by Statutory Duties as defined under the Insurance Contracts Act (1984). Details of the Compulsory Owner's Liability insurance are set out in the Relevant Schedule
5. Personal effects
The Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss or damage caused to personal belongings, equipment or property which is brought onto the Showground by an Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees or Agents.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Emergency information and Emergency Assembly Points for the various animal pavilions and stables will be included with Exhibitor Entry Detail Returns and Notice to Exhibitor mail outs. Competitors should be familiar with these plans.

FIRST AID

During the Royal Adelaide Show, St John Ambulance provides First Aid Services but it is suggested that competitors have a basic First Aid kit if minor injuries are a possibility.

RA&HS EMERGENCY FACILITIES

Fire fighting and other emergency equipment must not be removed or used for any other purpose. Missing or unserviceable equipment should be reported to the Venue Management Office immediately.

SMOKING

The RA&HS Smoking Code does not permit smoking inside buildings, within 10 metres of a building entrance, around combustibles, during public performances or while handling hazardous materials.

TRAFFIC CONTROL

The RA&HS Traffic Control Code imposes speed restrictions within the Showground. For the duration of the Royal Adelaide Show the speed limit is 10 kph. The use of vehicles inside the Showground is closely managed during the Royal Adelaide Show. Conditions of entry will be provided with the issue of Vehicle Entry Permits.

ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT

1. Competitors should supply their own "Safety Switch" (RCD) for installation at each power outlet they use.
2. Extension cords must be earthed and all electrical appliances must be earthed or double insulated. Appliances must be in sound working order and safety tagged.
3. Power boards with overload protection can only be used at the discretion of the Venue Services Manager.
4. The use of double adaptors is strictly prohibited.
5. Appliances and power cables must not be used or laid through any area that may become wet.
6. Power cables must not be laid across walkways, paths, roads or any area where damage could occur to the cable.
7. Bar (resistance) heaters must not be used.
8. Light sockets must not be used for any other purpose than for lighting.
